**Dr. Caroline Torres**

Still Giving Candy?: Revisiting Skinner's Operant Conditioning

Presenter: Jieun Kim

# Summary

This presentation introduces a simple technique to motivate students. This rewarding system is a combination of fixed-schedule and variable-schedule reinforcement; participation in class is rewarded with a raffle. Using this technique, low-achieving and peer-pressured learners can be motivated to more actively participate in class.

Jieun is a Ph.D. student in Second Language Studies at University of Hawai'i at Mānoa. She taught English at a middle school and a high school in Korea. She is currently working on multiple projects related to language testing.

Multimodal Companion to Reading Presenters: Tom Court & Mike Solis Affiliations: BYU-Hawaii & Trailforks

# Summary

For language learners, an important component of UDL is providing multiple opportunities to make language instruction and assessment more accessible. The Multimodal Companion to Reading (MC) is a new hypermedia glossary in development that provides multiple examples of vocabulary use in accessible contexts with the goal of increasing depth of vocabulary knowledge and reading engagement.

#### Bios

Tom Court teaches EIL and TESOL classes at Brigham Young University-Hawai'i. He is also a doctoral candidate in the Ed.D. in TESOL program at Anaheim University. He previously taught for Oregon State University, BYU-Idaho Pathway, and multiple schools in California, Japan and Canada.

He has extensive knowledge and expertise in various programming languages and technologies. Resonating with the conference theme on design, we present our large-scale design-based research project aiming to create a Virtual Reality (VR) language learning environment in which multilingual learners take linguistic actions against a degraded ecosystem. Design principles and preliminary findings of the effectiveness of VR play will be reported.

#### **Bios**

Michaela Nuesser is ABD at the University of Hawai'i at Manoa's Second Language Studies Department, has a Master of Education in Germany and an M.A. in the USA. Her interests are Ecolinguistics, Cognitive Linguistics, and Virtual Reality in Language Teaching.

Dongping Zheng, associate professor in the Department of Second Language Studies at University of Hawai'i at Mānoa, has a Ph.D. in Educational Psychology from University of Connecticut. She embraces ecological perspectives and advanced technologies in her applied work.

Jin Dong is ABD at the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa's East Asian Languages and Literatures Department, has an M.A. in SLA from Beijing Language and Culture University. Her interests include (trans)languaging, Virtual Reality, and game-based language learning.

Revising by Reading Aloud: Does It Benefit L2 Writers?

Presenters: Grant Eckstein, Michelle Lung & Natasha Gillette

# Summary

While reading one's own writing aloud (RA) is a common self-revision strategy, especially in writing centers, little evidence shows whether L2 writers benefit from it. We studied 60 ESL writers, half of whom used RA, and found that it reduced errors but was significantly less effective than teacher feedback.

#### **Bios**

Grant Eckstein is associate chair of the linguistics department at Brigham Young University, Provo where he teaches graduate teacher training courses. His research interests include writing development and pedagogy. He is the associate editor of Journal of Response to Writing.

Michelle Lung has a master's degree in TESOL from where she teaches first-year writing and intensive English classes at the English Language Center (ELC). Her research interests are second language writing, self-efficacy, self-regulation, and self-assessments.

Natasha Gillette is a second language writing teacher with a PhD in Educational Leadership and Administration, a Masters in Public Administration, and an MA in TESOL. Her research examines the experiences of minority and second-language students in college, including their writing development.

# Summary

While not everyone agrees that grammar is fun, it should certainly be relatable: relevant to the students' needs and accessible. This presentation will summarize a number of different ways to achieve this goal.

This presentation aims to report the findings of design-based research on textbook-based and technology-mediated language learning. Thick description and task analysis were conducted to observe the characteristics of these different designs in terms of the wise use of both instructions to create an optimal learning environment.

With over 20 years of experience as a public high school English teacher in Japan, Aya is currently studying the use of technology in language learning at the University of Hawai'i at Manoa as a Fulbright Scholar.

A study on Foreign Language Pronunciation Through a Singer's Lenses

This presentation will explore a trained singer's struggles of learning to sing in a foreign language and how this can be overcome with tools by trained singers to perfect pronunciation. With these tools, teachers of a second language can transfer it to the classroom for aiding students in learning.

Nicole Hannah is an M.A. student at the University of Hawai'i at Manoa studying Second Language Studies. With a background in trained singing, she wanted to use this knowledge and transfer it over to second language acquisition

A Corpus Analysis of Plesionyms Attribute, Characteristic, and Trait

# Summary

This talk briefly introduces the phenomenon of plesionyms and potential problems it poses to English language learners. Using the plesionyms attribute, characteristic, and trait, I will demonstrate how to use corpus data to discover differences in academic prose. Then, it discusses ESL teaching implications, including one corpusinformed lesson following the Illustration-Induction-Interaction (I-I-I) model.

#### Bio

Sadie Nitta is currently an MA in TESOL candidate and Graduate Assistant at Hawai'i Pacific University. She has taught English in Japan and Hawai'i. Her main research interests are corpus linguistics, sociolinguistics, and peace linguistics.

# **Room 123**

Use a Spelling-Test for a Practical UDL Application

# Summary

Spelling is a variable skill in academic writing. Although technology has many spell-check aids, students in EIL227 were making too many spelling, punctuation, and verb-tense errors that were distracting in their writing. The goal was to engage students in actively eliminating the errors by having them do weekly spelling-tests.

#### Bio

Luana loves teaching English as an International Language/EIL at Brigham Young University Hawai'i. She's been an adjunct professor since 2011. This semester she's teaching Intermediate Writing to 40 international students. She has a BA from BYUH in TESOL and a Masters in Curriculum Instruction from the American College of Education at Indianapolis.

I will show a teaching unit aiming to help students acquire basic verbs of actions, nouns of court objects, as well as explain how my teaching unit combines all four strands of a balanced curriculum: meaning-focused input, meaning-focused output, language-focused learning, and fluency development.

Fostering FL learners' Identity, Agency, and Resourcefulness in COIL Classrooms

# Summary

This study investigates the effectiveness of the design of a collaborative online international learning (COIL) class with FL students in Japan and Hawai'i. It resonates with UDL guidelines with respect to action and expression and engagement. Findings show our COIL class fosters learners' resourcefulness along with identity and agency development.

Creating an Academic Spoken L2 Learner Corpus: Which ASR Should We Use

# Summary

In this presentation, we describe a research study which seeks to answer the question of which ASR program is the most accurate and cost effective for the purposes of building a spoken learner corpus. We collected speech data from advanced learners in our EAP program, created reference transcripts, and compared them to the hypothesis transcripts of several ASR systems. We will also discuss the results and implications of our research findings.

Ling Wong is a senior at Brigham Young University-Hawaii majoring in TESOL Education. Her primary research interests include sociolinguistics, speech perception, and second language acquisition.
